This week we continue a series looking at the Psalms. We were last in this series in 2021. The Psalms are poems and songs written for Israel during the time of the Old Testament. Often, they helped them worship God in the temple. Sometimes they were words for the king himself or for the individual to take upon their own lips. Many Christians use the Psalms to spur their own prayers – giving words to their wordless groans.

In the New Testament, Jesus took these words and used them for himself. In these moments, he extraordinarily revealed to us the very heart and cries of God himself. The Psalms are an insight into how God's own Son felt, experienced life, death and the promises of God. Enjoy them, revel in them, and draw upon them as you draw near to God.



Prayers for the Service

These prayers are used during the service. Prayer is a privilege we are given because Christ died for us. His death & resurrection means we can confidently approach God seeking forgiveness (Hebrews 10:22). If you believe that Christ died to deal with your failings then you should be confident to pray with us. If you are still exploring who Christ is then feel free to listen in.

A Prayer of Confession

Heavenly Father, you have loved us with an everlasting love, but we have gone our own way, and rejected your will for our lives.
We are sorry for our sins and turn away from them. For the sake of your Son who died for us, forgive us, cleanse us, and change us.
By your Holy Spirit, enable us to live for you, and to please you in every way; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

¹⁵For we do not have a high priest who is unable to feel sympathy for our weaknesses, but we have one who has been tempted in every way, just as we are – yet he did not sin. ¹⁶Let us then approach God's throne of grace with confidence, so that we may receive mercy and find grace to help us in our time of need.

- 1. Psalms are songs that were originally sung by Israel. How might you divide this psalm into stanzas?
- 2. In which verses does:
 - a) David tell God to do something for him?
 - b) David tell God how he is feeling?
 - c) David talk about and to his enemies?
- 3. How would you describe David's mood at the start of the psalm and the end?
- 2. What is David's understanding of God in relation to his own anguish?

3. How would you describe David's relationship with God as he suffers?

- 4. Read the following passage about Jesus (Matt 26:36-46). As the great descendent of David, how does Jesus fulfil this Psalm?
- 5. Look at the following passages, (2 Cor 1:3-5; 2 Cor 12:7b-10; Heb. 4:14-16; 1 Pet 5:7; Rev 21:1-4). How is a Christian equipped for times of personal trouble and anguish?



GaP Group Reflection Watch the video provided to your group leader.

- 1. Can you recount a time you served someone and found great joy in the task despite the challenges and difficulty?
- 2. How can we be a church whose core values is 'generous service of others'? What can we do to encourage each other this way?

Prayer

- 1. Spend some time praying with each other in light of our troubles in life.
- 2. Pray that we would be assured of God's comfort, presence and hope amid our sufferings.

Read the Bible with us!

- Is there a particular line you like or find interesting?
- 2. How might this psalm/song talk about Jesus?
- 3. How can we sing these words ourselves as followers of Jesus?
