Welcome to St Stephen's. We're glad to have you with us today. As the school holiday period ends and many return to the regular rhythms, we think being here is a great decision.

We've been looking at the Old Testament book of Genesis. It's the starting point for the Bible's account of the world. The Bible situates your experiences, questions, suffering, joys, hopes, and ambitions in a great story. You are not part of some meaningless moment but included in the great story that God is unfurling slowly. To understand yourself, the world and those around you well requires understanding that story. The beginning, the middle and the end matter. Genesis is the beginning. It points to the middle – Jesus's life, death and resurrection. It prepares us for the end – Jesus's return to judge and renew the world. Come find your place in the story!

Evil is at Home   G	ienesis 37:1-36

- 1. Human evil leads to more human evil
  - a. The favouritism of a parent (v. 1-4)

# Gospel and Prayer (GaP) Group Study

1. What answers and reactions do people have when they see horrible stories of human evil on the news?

#### **Read Genesis 37**

### Getting your head around the passage:

Use as many questions as you need to ensure you understand the passage's contents.

- A. How does Jacob's treatment of his children set up what is to follow in this story?
- B. How do Joseph's brothers respond to Jacob's preference for him and also when they hear his dreams?
- C. How does their jealousy lead to further evil towards Joseph in this story?
- D. What do you make of Reuben and Judah's roles in this story?
- E. How many times is God referenced in this story?
- 2. Why do you think that God is not referenced in this story? What might this tell us about human evil?
- 3. How does the human evil Genesis 37 echo previous examples of human evil in Genesis? (eg. skim Gen 3, 4, 27)
- 4. How does the view of human evil in Genesis differ from how our world sees human evil?

### Read Matthew 26:14-15 and 1 Peter 2:21-25

5. How does this story of Joseph foreshadow what Christ does?

6. What difference does it make to you that God dealt with human evil by becoming a victim of human evil?

### Prayer

- A. Spend time confessing our sins before God and finding assurance in the blood of Jesus
- B. If you are experiencing human evil, spend time praying for God's patience and deliverance. Pray in longing for heaven where there will be no more tears, pain, evil and death.
