1. Are we getting smarter?

2. Are we getting smarter about ourselves? The battleground around understanding who we are

3. Jesus on who we are (Mark 7:1-23)

i. Jesus affirms being authentic and challenges human traditions (v. 1-13)

ii. Jesus's challenging view on the authentic human self (v. 14-23)

4. Are we smarter than Jesus?

Some content to discuss over a coffee:

1. What did you find interesting from the talk on Sunday? What did you disagree with or find unconvincing?
2. Do you think we are getting smarter as a human race? Why or why not?
3. How much do you think it matters to you whether we are progressing as a human race or not?
4. Do you think IQ and intelligence is the best way to measure 'smartness'? Are there better words to describe human progress? (ie. Growing in wisdom, understanding, social/emotional responsibility/competence)
5. Are there ways of understanding the world from the past that you think would be helpful to (or even better than) how we understand the world now?

Some content to discuss over a coffee:

1. What do you think about the following quote?

"[People today believe that] when you are figuring out how to lead your life, the most important answers are found deep inside yourself."
- David Brooks, writer of New York Times, The Road to Character

- 2. How might this be a different way of looking for the big questions of life in the past?
- 3. Have you ever felt the pressure of something outside yourself (ie. Family traditions, social/cultural traditions etc.) telling you who you are and have to be? Do you think that was helpful or unhelpful to you?

Gordon (the speaker on Sunday) showed that Jesus affirms our desire for being authentic (He cared about our 'hearts') and challenged religious traditions for missing the point. But Jesus also said this about our inner, authentic self: "What comes out of a person is what defiles them. For it is from within, out of a person's heart, that evil thoughts come…" (Mark 7:20-21a).

4. What strikes you about what Jesus says here? Do you agree or disagree? Why?
